EVANGELISM

The department exists to enhance and oversee the spiritual welfare of the Mission staff and Raising Standards of Righteousness through *setting our villages on fire for Christ*. We thank God for His sufficient grace, favour and providence that enabled us to be co-workers in God's agenda. This is in obedience to the Great Commission: "*Go and Make Disciples of All Nations---*" Matthew 28: 19-20.

The following are the key programmes through which the activities are done:

Intercessory Empowerment Programme

This is the backbone of the Mission, and promotes prayer life through empowerment to our targets. In the year;

- 14 new intercessory centres were established to make a total of 60 to bring us to slightly over 3000 Intercessors.
- 60 intercessory coordinators/facilitators were trained on monthly basis
- We co-ordinated end month praying and fasting with an average attendance of about 100 participants every fasting weekend.
- Weekly intercessions by staff were being held on Thursdays in addition to daily morning devotions.

Leadership Development Programme

In the year, we had a nine-months Interchristian Church Leadership Training. This was in 5 training centres, one in Webuye division and 3 in Kimilili division. 172 leaders were trained and commissioned in our annual conference held at Moi Girls' High School, Kamusinga. The course involved over 50 different denominations.

Children's Ministry Programme

- We trained and commissioned 125 children workers.
- Those commissioned are reaching the neighbouring primary schools
- We conducted several gospel outreaches and reached over 5000 children in 5 primary schools within and outside Kimilili division.
- We conducted 2 graduations in conjunction with the trained children's workers in their churches.

Gospel Outreach Programme

We planned and conducted an outreach campaign to Retirees from Chebukwabi sub-location in Kimilili division. 140 attended and many gave their lives to Jesus.

- In liaison with the Lugari Interchristian Fellowship and the local churches, we had a major gospel outreach in Mautuma, Lugari District where 87 people were prayed for for salvation.

- We reached with the gospel well over 9000 boys and adults during the circumcision intervention project.

Ministry By Invitation

The activities here, range from Sunday services, seminars, weekend challenges/rallies in churches, schools, Colleges, home visits to individual families.

About 20 preaching engagements; 7 of these in schools, 3 weekend challenges and rallies. The rest were in churches.

- Over 5000 people were reached with the gospel and many prayed for for salvation
- Over 200 were prayed for for the infilling of the Holy Spirit

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Accelerating Socio-economic transformation activities - Holy Living and Hard Work.

Improvement of community educational facilities

The aim of this programme is to promote all round education development.

The main areas of concern are:

- Provision of physical facilities of identified poor community primary schools.
- Promotion of academic performance in Kimilili Division.
- Placement of Community Libraries with an aim of stepping up readership in the communities.

Provision of physical facilities

The Mission in partnership with Harambee Foundation, Holland and the community has provided the following facilities:-

- Kimingichi Primary School - six classrooms
- Kamusinga Primary School - five classrooms and an administration block.
- Lutonyi Primary School - renovation of seven classrooms and construction of three new ones.
- Completion of D.E.C first floor classes.

The Mission in partnership with Kimilili Trust and the community has provided the following facilities:

- Buko Primary School - four classes and administration block.
- A concrete water Tank holding a capacity of 26,000 litres of water at Buko Primary School.
- Nasioya primary school - two modern class rooms

Promotion Of Academic Performance

The Mission through this programme aims at improving the academic standard in schools by collaborating with the parents, teachers and Ministry of Education.

To motivate hard working schools and individual student performers the Mission together with Kimilili Trust gave 5 modern desks to each of the ten most improved schools in Kimilili Division. The same will be extended to other ten most improved in the next financial year.

Circumcision Intervention Project 2006

- IcFEM provided safe circumcision for 7045 boys from parts of Bungoma, Mount Elgon, and Trans-Nzvia Districts at the cost of Ksh. 4.8 Million.
- The community saved about Ksh. 0.5 Billion which would have been spent on ceremonies and feasting.
- Circumcision candidates did not waste school time dancing on the road in preparation for circumcision.
- More than 8000 people received spiritual guidance and New Testaments.
- 13 abnormal medical conditions were discovered during circumcision and corrected and over 45 cases were referred to other hospitals.
- 216 staff were involved during the circumcision exercise.

Community Service Offenders Programme

The IcFEM Mission in partnership with the Government through the Probation Department has been actively involved in promoting the community service order since 2002. From May 2005 to March 2006, 200 community service offenders were identified to go through a rehabilitation programme that took 6 months. The cost was Kshs. 180 000/=.

The graduation ceremony was attended by the National Director, Provincial, District and Divisional Community Service Offenders Programme officials. Since the start of this programme, over 30 offenders have been placed at the Mission to serve their terms.

EDUCATION

KHALAYI NURSERY SCHOOL

Our Nursery School has fared on well as a friendly pre-school centre. The little children had a good time throughout the year. The staff of 6 has offered enthusiastic services to the children. At the end of 2006 the school released 37 well-prepared children to the Primary Schools in the surrounding area. In January 2007 the school admitted 38 beginners in Baby Class (18 boys and 20 girls).

The School experienced a financial challenge in the year mainly because there was a decrease in number of children and also the prices of the commodities used especially for mid-morning snacks went up, yet it was not possible to raise fees in the middle of the year. The Management is currently looking into the matter for a more successful next year.

The Mission Holiday Club Programme has developed well through the year. The attendance has progressively improved in the 3 school holidays (April 35, August 166, December 135) in which it has been held. We praise God for this programme which aims to provide an opportunity for children to break from their strenuous academic life to an enjoyable time of Christian ministry. This year we had 2 visitors from UK (Beth Yuill and Charlotte Harrad) who supported the programme especially in August. The visitors supported us with various activity materials hence we were able to charge the children less. This helped us to get more children in August and also paved way for the next meeting in December. We thank God for them.

The D.E.C enrolment has increased. This is basically attributed to:

- Good KCPE results
- Availability of boarding facilities
- Good pupils discipline
- Biblical guidance to pupils
- Good learning facilities and environment
- Manageable number (35) of pupils per class.

During this year the academic programmes in the school have gone well. The school mean score in KCPE increased from 325 in 2005 when we had 15 candidates to 347 in 2006 when we had 21 candidates. In the year 2007 the school has registered 28 candidates and we hope for good results.

With the increase in number of children, the school had to increase the number of staff. The school has a total of 26 staff.

In the next financial year they are also helping us to improve school furniture and equipment in the offices, classrooms and library. We thank them for this great work. May God bless them. The link between DEC and Danetree School in U.K, continued. We welcomed two teachers, Mrs. Rosemary Woodward and Miss Sarah Watling, for a week in May.

STUDENT SPONSORSHIP REPORT

We have 53 High School students in 23 different schools in Bungoma, Kakamega, Teso, and Tranzoia Districts (26 boys & 27 Girls).

17 did KCSE (2006) and obtained the following grades:-

B+ (3) B (1) B- (1)
C+ (3) C (3) D+ (2) D (3)

17 formerly sponsored students are in colleges and Universities

The Annual Workshop for sponsored students with their parents/guardians was successfully held in August. 47 students attended. This addresses the all round needs of a student.

COREL PROGRAMME

The Small Enterprise Development programme progressively developed during this period of time. Thanks to God for His providence for our Community Revolving Loan Scheme (COREL) The programme started with 100 clients and has grown to 140 clients in seven groups of 20 members each. Two groups, i.e. group 6 (Emmanuel) and group 7, (El Shadai) were introduced into the scheme to join our initial 5 groups. The clients are taken from the wider Bungoma and parts of Mt. Elgon Districts. Membership is attained through applications, then business assessment and subsequent basic training.

Clients response has been quite positive with over 75% repayment rate. Major activities in this period included serious defaulted loan follow-up. These have proved fruitful but need much effort and strict binding policies.

Shares have continued to rise as a way of clients' savings and collateral on the loans given the simplified COREL terms fitting to the communities' economic situation and income levels.

Clients in the scheme carry out diverse economic projects. A number of success stories have been noted. Training has served to transform and empower members business management skills. About six special training sessions were held to address different issues affecting clients, much have been achieved hence.

During the period COREL developed a new leadership and administrative structures to fit the Mission's new structure. Each group has a 3 member representation in the main committee of 21 members. The 21 further elected an executive team of 11 officials with the responsibilities of formulating and administering of policies on the ground. They are also meant to advise the office on matters pertaining to membership, loans etc. This strategy is meant to empower the community with 'hands off, eyes on' slogan

COREL has a bright future of a massive community bank that tends to unfold each day. With additional prayer backing and financial support from our friends and partners we can behold the big dream sooner than later.

LIBRARY

The library is being used and people are turning up to read. We have Christian materials, Maths and Physics books, Children's materials and Bibles and Bible study aids. We also have Audio tapes and Video Cassettes. We have received books from Sovereign World Trust and Magazines from Tear Fund and Herald of His Coming.

Some teachers have registered to use the Maths and Physics books. Pastors and other readers are using the reference section for research.

Community Library services

The Mission has 10 community libraries established within the community. This is mainly to step up readership in the community. However, with the start of Field Units, some of the libraries will be directed to the Field Units to enhance proper management and supervision. Each of the libraries has an average of 20 members.

NAIROBI LIAISON OFFICE

The main function of the office during the year has been liaison with Government Departments and third parties on the following matters:-

- Tax exemption on donated Land Rovers.
- Coordination of clearance and movement for container goods.
- Follow up on application for electricity supply for Dreamland including rebate for connection charges.
- Coordination of arrivals/departures for overseas visitors.

We are grateful to the U.K. Team who sent vehicles, hospital equipment and other donations in the container, which took almost a year to reach Kimilili.

RELIEF AND WELFARE

Care for the elderly

We were able to reach 3 groups from different areas; Misikhu, Matili and Kamusinga with training, formation and running outreaches in the respective areas. Support for six needy wazee with treatment at DMCC.

Crisis Intervention

Over 40 individuals and families have been treated at DMCC. Other families have been given food and clothing and even burial preparations.

COMMUNICATIONS

Activities in this department picked up quite well last year. After embarking on the programme of having every member of staff computer literate, we have made good progress and we can confidently say many members of staff are able to perform normal tasks on a computer.

Our computer school has also shown a tremendous pickup. During the period between June 2006 and April 2007, we have realized an enrolment of up to 217 students. The number increases week after week.

Internet services have drastically improved though with a few normal hitches occurring. The number of clients from within and without have increased. We realized a collection from internet, document typesetting, scanning, printing and photocopying.

The satellite link though quite expensive has been critical for the Mission's communication with friends and partners overseas. Relief may come in the near future when the Fibre Optic Cable under installation nationally is completed.

However, frequent power failures have affected us a great deal. Apart from losing in terms of production hours, this has caused great damage to our communication equipment, some beyond repair.

Otherwise for sure, this far we have reached, it has taken God's hand. Praise be to Him.

BOOKSHOP:

During the year, the sales activities were concentrated on Christian materials Bibles hymn books, Christian literature, stationery and craft articles. The school supplies were discontinued due to serious payment defaulters. The inventory consisted mainly of carried over books from the previous year plus modest purchases during the year. There is plan to relocate the bookshop in future to attract more customers with a view to boost sales. The bookshop is the best stocked Christian bookshop in Western Province and is strategic for Field Units.

LORRY:

The Lorry was used for transport in construction of special projects at Nasioya, Kimingichi and Kimilili R.C. It was also provided for hire to third parties to transport construction materials. The asset was operated at a profit to the Mission.

FARM:

The farm grows maize, vegetables, coffee and raises two livestock. The maize and vegetables are consumed mainly by the Dreamland Education Centre. The farm also serves as an Educational facility for DEC. The operations of the farm have suffered from the normal agricultural risks of unpredictable weather, poor markets and constraints in working capital. It planned to make the farm self-sustaining after availing needed capital.

TAILORING:

The tailoring shop makes school uniforms for D.E.C and clothes for individuals. Embroidery, which had been doing well, has been affected by the departure of the embroidery tailor. A faithful embroidery tailor is required. Due to reduced activity, the operation was not self-sustaining. However, there is great potential in niche markets, which are being explored for exploitation. Location is another factor, as the shop is not well situated compared to the competition.
